GALA LADS - THOROBREDS NEW CHAMPS KIPPERS 12th - PONY EXPRESSMEN 7th

Central States can be proud of their entries in the International Convention in Kansas City and can look forward with anticipation to even greater accomplishments from them in the future.

The Kippers of St. Joseph — North Kansas City did exceedingly well in the contest by being chosen as semifinalists and then, to the delight of all Central Staters, taking the number 12 spot among the 45 quartets which competed. This is a tremendous jump for the Kippers from their standing of 28th last year in Philly and bespeaks great things to come from these four lads. The songs which carried them to this honor were, "Darktown Strutters' Ball" and "My Buddy"; "The Roaring 20's" and "Girl of My Dreams".

The Pony Expressmen of St. Joseph also made a fine showing and won the 7th place rating among the choruses with their new straw skimmers and singing "Hard Hearted Hannah" and "Broken Hearted".

The Champion Quartet for 1962 is the GALA LADS, a fine quartet from Alhambra, California. They made it to the top with a leap from 9th place last year in Philadelphia. They thrilled the audience with their beautiful control and feeling for their songs, plus the inevitable championship blend and accuracy.

The THOROBREDS of Louisville, Kentucky, dazzled the audiences with some of the most precise singing and stage movements seen on a contest stage in a long while and took top honors without a shadow of a doubt.

This year a new trophy was presented to the winning quartet and chorus besides the regular traveling championship trophies. The new trophy was the ASCAP Trophy, a beautiful silver urn. This trophy is a permanent one and will be presented each year by ASCAP.

The NUBBINS and VIGORTONES, Central States' other entries in the quartet contests did themselves proud and placed 29th and 33rd, respectively. They appeared a second time at the Quartet Jamboree on Friday, at which all quartets not going on into the semifinals are given an opportunity to sing their show material. The NUBBINS were even given an encore which is rare at an International Convention.

Kansas City was literally swarming with Barbershoppers for the four days of the Convention and everything was so well organized and planned by the hosting Kansas City area chapters, that the convention seemed to run along effortlessly, as all well organized events should.

With some 5000 barbershoppers and families to house, feed and otherwise accommodate, the Kansas City Chapters are to be congratulated on how very smoothly the entire week's events ran. The SERENADE salutes Liaison Chairman, "Pete" Peterson and Convention Co-Chairman, Don Thorne, and all their committee chairmen and workers for carrying the convention to such a great and satisfactory completion.

The HARMONY HAWKS have been a busy bunch recently. On Good Friday the chorus participated in the Cedar Rapids Lenten Services at which 900 were in attendance. The chapter's annual Parade was held on April 28 with the Schmitt Bros., as headliners. From the profits of the show the chapter was able to contribute \$500 to Camp Good Health, \$300 to the Cerebral Palsy Foundation and \$200 to the Shrine Crippled Children's Fund, in memory of Duane Platner. The chapter also happily reports that the DIPLOMATS have reorganized with Buzz Brown as contact man. His address is 650 Twenty-eighth St. Ct. S.E., Cedar Rapids. Fourteen C.R. men attended the K.C. International convention.

One of Harry's favorite and best known barbershop activities is his "music exchange". If the song has been written, Harry probably has it in his files. He has over 300 pieces of music on ditto forms and distributes copies and arrangements all over the U.S. Rare indeed is the chapter which does not have at least one piece of music from Harry.

Harry has coached many quartets including the ALTITUNES and the SPRING-SINGERS. He has even sung in some quartets.

When he gets settled in California, Harry is looking forward to forming a chapter of "old folks" and with his background, how can he miss? Harry, all of Central States is sorry to lose you and we wish you the very best in your new home and hope you will come back to visit from time to time.



SCHOLARSHIPS FOR CHORUS DIRECTORS ANNOUNCED


